



Becoming a Man by P. Carl

A remarkable, deeply moving memoir of one man's gender transition amid a pivotal political moment in America.




IM by Isaac Mizrahi

The Man Who Ate Too Much: The Life of James Beard by John Birdsall



Mr. Know-it-All by John Waters


The newest essay collection from The New York Times best-selling John Waters reflects on how to overcome newfound responsibility and rebel in the autumn of your years.






Officer Clemmons by Dr. François S. Clemmons


Rainbow Warrior: My Life in Color by Gilbert Baker
